NHS 111 is the first port of call for emergency Repeat Medication

Patients who are in immediate need, or require emergency repeat medications, (which may include running out of medication, losing or damaging medicines, or patients going away from home and forgetting their medication), will need to visit www.111.nhs.uk or call 111 to request emergency medication. Please do not call the Practice as we will be unable to assist you.

NHS 111 will assess the need and where appropriate an emergency supply of medication from a local community pharmacy will be arranged.

Requests for routine non-urgent prescriptions are still managed via the Prescription Ordering Direct (POD) or the NHS App. We would like to encourage patients to think ahead before any holidays or bank holidays to avoid running out of their medication and to ensure you have enough supply.
